### Chairman's Corner -

The ANC has come and gone and without question Bruce Neill and his organising committee did us proud. Ominous rumblings from various quarters prior to the event quickly dissipated and I've heard nothing but compliments from the ABF, our brethren organisations in other states, and most importantly from the participants in the event. So on behalf of the NSWBA I would like to formally thank Bruce, Chris Nettle, Kim Neale, Julian Foster, Matthew McManus, Judy Mott, Judy Frazier and Ross Stuart, all of whom worked tirelessly to stage the 2005 ANC, as well as the countless other volunteers, too numerous to name, who contributed to its success.

It was naturally gratifying that the NSW Open and Seniors' teams won their respective Interstate Championship, while the Women's team placed second in their event. Such a strong showing in a national championship would suggest that perhaps the tournament structure and selection methods used by the NSWBA to pick its representative teams are not entirely without merit. Also notable, was Bruce Neill's remarkable effort in winning the Open Butler, easily the most gruelling event in the Bridge calendar, despite the burdens of being the convener.

The other major event held in Sydney last month was the World Youth Teams championships which attracted teams from 17 countries. Staged under the auspices of the WBF and the ABF, it was jointly convened by David Stern and Peter Gill. While the NSWBA's formal contribution was limited to sponsoring the Opening Ceremony, there was ample opportunity to showcase the Bridge talent we have here in NSW, with Ish Del'Monte, Kieran Dyke, David

Beauchamp, Richard Jedrychowski, and Bruce Neill providing much of the Vugraph commentary and Ron Klinger co-editing the Daily Bulletin.

An important date to note in your diary is the weekend of 10-11 December when a special event will be held to pick the NSW team for the 2006 Commonwealth Nations Bridge Championship. This event, which is a precursor to the Commonwealth games being held in Melbourne next March, will provide members of the NSW team an opportunity to gain championship experience at the highest levels as it is anticipated that at least 20 international teams will compete. To give all pairs a fair chance, the NSWBA proposes to run the selection event as a Butler Pairs, with the top three pairs comprising the NSW team. Moreover, the event is being held on a weekend to give non-metropolitan pairs the opportunity to compete. I look forward to seeing you there.

The simplest way to check someone’s Masterpoint status and recent points earned is to go to the ABF web site. If you are at the NSWBA web site simply put your cursor over the ABF logo bottom left of home page

Now you are at the Masterpoints Search panel you follow the prompts (search by ABF No or by name). Once West produces ♥A then surely East 'needs' to have ♣K plus ♥K together with the ♠K and ♠Q to make up a 1 spade opening. Therefore you play ♣A dropping the stiff king. Then you play a low heart from dummy- East wins but is endplayed. Why put this in the Bulletin you say? Well at the table a very experienced Declarer ( without stopping and thinking) made the 'reflex' play of a low club from dummy and that was -50 instead of +400.

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## The No 1 Secret of Winning Bridge

If you are an expert then this article is not for you. But otherwise please read on. In your Editor's humble view, counting is the No 1 secret of winning bridge, or rather I should say counting properly. Counting can be broken into three main groups (a) Counting a single suit (b) counting points and (c) counting tricks. This short article is concerned with (a) and the easiest way to get into this is to count trumps properly. Once you have learnt how to count trumps properly, the rest will follow more easily.

The wrong way to count trumps is something like this – draw one round of trumps to which both opponents follow and mentally count "four" since you know four trumps have gone. Check your hand where you have four trumps left and dummy has three left and the total is eleven. Eureka ! There are two trumps out. Draw another round of trumps and LHO shows out. Hmm re-check the Maths . . . four in the first round, three in the second = 7 and so on. Confession time : I counted this way in my first 18 months of bridge. And then I read some textbooks on card play and saw the light.

The right way to count trumps is to count the whole suit. Think of the possible layouts. Let's say you have nine trumps (five in hand and four in dummy). That leaves four with the opponents. The only possible layouts of the opponents trumps are 4-0, 3-1 or 2-2. Now draw a round of trumps and everyone follows. The 4-0 has been eliminated. Draw another round and LHO shows out — therefore the original trump layout was 5-4-3-1. If instead both opponents followed to the second round of trumps then the suit broke 5-4-2-2 and there are of course no more trumps out. No need to re-check your mental maths as is usually necessary when counting the wrong way as described above.

It will feel strange the first few times you count this way but after a short while it will become effortless and second nature. Once your (proper) trump counting becomes automatic your overall card play will become sharper for soon you will count ALL four suits this way and you will KNOW that the two little hearts over there in dummy are winners. You will also find yourself thinking about an opponent's ORIGINAL shape as shown or suggested by the bidding. Applying this methodology consistently will help you immeasurably. You can see your hand. You can see Dummy. So you KNOW 26 cards of this

deal. And after a few tricks have been played you will often 'know' most or all of one of the unseen hands. So if you 'know' 39 cards of a deal then the remaining 13 can be figured out. Here is a textbook hand that is well worth your study, showing the power of counting.

South opens 2NT and North bids 7NT. A quick tally of winners tells you that you need to make four tricks in clubs. Most of the time the suit will "behave" but what if one opponent began with ♣ J x x x and you play the suit the wrong way? The bridge player who 'counts' will solve this problem. You don't have to be an expert to get this hand right. *But it will take some concentration and careful Counting.*

West leads ♦10. You win ♦A then cash ♦K (everyone follows), then cash ♦Q and East discards ♠3. NOTE ! the diamond suit was originally 5-3-2-3. Now cash a top spade- all follow. Cash another top spade and West shows out ditching ♦3. NB the spade suit was 1—3—6—3 around the table. Now cash the third top spade and West ditches another diamond. Finally you cash the top three hearts and both opponents follow suit. Counting has proven to you that EAST began life with six spades, two diamonds and three hearts (maybe four). *Thus the most number of clubs East can have is two.* So if the clubs are 4-1 only West has 'room' for them. So you cash ♣K followed by ♣Q and East shows out. You now claim your grand slam taking the marked club finesse for +1510. You can be sure that if a hand like this appeared in a major tournament there would be quite a few declarers who would fail to make 13 tricks in NT. They are the players who can't be bothered to count in this fashion either because it is too much work (takes the fun out of the game might be their comment?). Train yourself to think of groups of 13 cards in terms of 6 -4 -2 - 1 or 5-5-2-1 or 7-4-1-1 etc etc and your card play and defence will improve immeasurably. Peter Jamieson

## GNOT Sydney Metropolitan Final August 27-28

Four Sydney Metropolitan teams had already succeeded in qualifying direct to the National Final in Tweed Heads November 18-21. Those teams were two from NSWBA captained by BRIFMAN and LAVINGS, one from Double Bay Bridge Centre captained by NOBLE and one from Trumps Bridge Club captained by LAZER.

58 teams representing clubs from all over Sydney faced the starters gun at 10 am Saturday morning to play a series of 14 board knock out matches with a Swiss repechage. To view player's names and their clubs, you need to visit the NSWBA web site, select GNOT Finals then select Teams.

After four matches on Saturday, only four teams were left in the knock out. Those four played 28 board KO matches and the results were :

DOUBLE BAY ( M Derofe, I Del'Monte, K Dyke, T Nunn, D Wiltshire beat

BRIDGE AT CLUB WILLOUGHBY 1 ( G Finikiotis, R Kumar, L Fanos, A Ramer) by 80 to 10 IMPs.

In the other final KO match NSWBA 3 ( R Sebesfi, F Curtis, D Weston, K Crowe-Mai) beat NSWBA 1 ( A Yezerski, J Foster, D Zines, T Moss, R Jamieson, P Jamieson) by 68 to 50 IMPs.

The final two rounds of 14 board matches in the Repechage Swiss saw the above mentioned Finikiotis team finish on top followed by DOUBLE BAY 2 ( A Hutton, H Hutton, T Ong, C Boylson).

Try six diamonds on a ♦J lead. A spade must be lost. A heart ruff plus top tricks adds up to 11 tricks. You need ♠A & ♠K to be tripleton (unlikely) OR one defender to have A or K four times in ♠ plus ♣Q & ♣J. But you must "isolate the menace". Win ♦K at T1 then at T2 duck a spade. Win ♦ return, cross to ♥A ruff a ♠. Then cash ♥K & ♥Q and ruff ♥ 8 in dummy. Ruff another ♠ leaving South to guard ♠Q. Cash your last diamond on which South is squeezed in the black suits and that is +1370 !
