Chairman's Corner

Something rather significant happened last month, the second largest of our affiliated clubs in NSW acquired the fifth largest one. While mergers & acquisitions are all the rage on the stock market, the trend on the local bridge scene over recent years has been one of ever increasing fragmentation – to the point where Sydney now has more bridge clubs than London, a city three times its size. The inevitable consequence of this has been a decline in table numbers at individual clubs with an attendant deterioration in club finances. Nor have clubs been able to make up the shortfall in revenue from regular sessions by holding congresses. More clubs has meant a more congested Congress Calendar so these events are no longer the sure fire money-spinners they were in the past. Some might argue that that's just our market economy at work, which may well be the case, but with so many Sydney clubs now struggling it's an unwelcome trend. The unfortunate reality is that in order for a bridge club to be able to offer top flight facilities in a city as expensive as Sydney it needs to be financially strong. And that strength can only come from a substantial, active and engaged membership.

These thoughts were prompted in part by an assessment we are currently undertaking of the air-conditioning facilities at the NSWBA. We are trying to ascertain whether the existing system complies with the relevant building codes in relation to temperature, ventilation, and noise for premises which at times accommodate over 200 people. Should it turn out that the existing system isn't compliant we will be calling for quotes to make it so. Without wishing to pre-empt the outcome, I don't imagine an upgrade, should it prove necessary, would come cheap.

Now I suppose in a city where an arts benefactor will put his hand in his pocket to the tune of \$10M for a violin, there is a slim possibility that someone might be willing to fund a major upgrade to our premises. Failing that, however, it will be the members and

players at the NSWBA who will ultimately end up footing the bill. Bulking up along the lines of the newly merged North Shore Bridge Club is one way to ease the pain.

Lindfield Bridge Club News

Following the Special General Meeting on January 13th resolutions were passed with majorities of approximately 85%. As a result Lindfield Bridge Club has become the **North Shore Bridge Club Inc.**, incorporating *Bridge at Club Willoughby* and *Cove Bridge*, previously owned and run by John McIlrath via his company John McIlrath Pty Ltd. As at end of February there is no more bridge available at the old Lindfield Bridge Club premises.

To play at North Shore Bridge Club costs \$9 for members, \$8 for concession members and \$11 for visitors. A reduction of \$1 is available to members wearing their club name badge. These rates will be applicable to all regular duplicate sessions conducted at Club Willoughby and at Cove Sports Centre. The North Shore Bridge Club will be ABF Club Number 02-120 (ex Lindfield). The new club will continue to operate as a non-profit making organization under the control of a committee according to the Club Rules (constitution) as amended by the resolutions approved on 13th January 2007. John McIlrath has been contracted to act as Bridge Manager, Bridge Director, and Congress Convener of this new club, and will be responsible for the day-to-day running of bridge.

Renovation work was carried out during February at both venues (new carpet, painting, air conditioning improvements). The North Shore Bridge Club web site is <http://www.northshore.bridge-club.org/> Web sites for the previous clubs will be closed down in due course.

Transport to/from Willoughby and Cove.

The best access is by car however there are a number of public transport options.

There will be further updates on various aspects of the new venture, which will be posted at the Club venues and on the Internet. The North Shore Bridge Club plans to be the premier bridge club operation in NSW, and look forward to receiving support from the bridge community in the coming months.

This deal turned up Monday night February 5 at NSWBA. This was the first night of stage I of the NSW Open Interstate Teams selection and the 39 North-South pairs were able to demonstrate their slam bidding skills or lack thereof. There is of course no slam making but 13 pairs bid to slam and, surprisingly, four NS pairs were successful. If your partnership treats the South hand as a game force, then the focus is on what methods you use after a 2 Club opening. Many pairs require the responder to only make a 'positive' response when holding three controls or more (Ace=2 and K=1) and they should get this right. After North fails to make a positive response, South knows there is a lack of controls problem.

- If NS play 'control responses' then over 2 Clubs, North bids 2 Hearts showing exactly two controls. Still a chance of slam if North has a shortage in hearts - -
- If South opens 1 spade, North bids 2 Clubs, then South bids 3 spades (forcing after 2 over 1) and North bids four spades – suggests minimum values and South might pass.
- If NS play the currently trendy 2D 'waiting' response to 2C then there is more room but the lack of heart control should be identified and the hopeless slam avoided.

OK – confession time, your Editor was North and had to go to the sin bin after this:

Marlene Watts was on lead and very smartly led out the top two hearts for down 1. After 5D from South, the message is clear that South does not have a hand suitable for Blackwood and so the possibility of

lack of heart control is almost palpable. My correct bid after 5D was to simply bid 5S and notch up +650. Would you and your regular (or favourite) partner stay out of trouble?

This next deal popped up during the final of the 2000 Spingold (one of the three top North American Bridge Championships each year). Looks like a ho-hum deal you might think as you examine the layout. But of course since it is under the spotlight in this Bulletin you would be wrong.

The e-bridge web site commentary was as follows:

"1NT was 14-16, 2♥ an artificial relay with spades (weak or invitational) or any game force. 2NT confirmed a game force and 3♣ asked for responders suit (hearts). The rest of the auction is murky, not only to us but also apparently to the players themselves. Sontag doubled 6♣ for the lead (in case Weichsel was on lead) and then doubled 6NT for penalty. And the lead was. . . a heart ! Good Grief. Lindkvist quickly cashed 11 tricks for down 1 (minus 100) instead of down five (minus 1100) on any minor suit lead ".

When the board was played at the other table, the North-South pair got into a muddle and also reached slam. OOPS !

No doubt you and your partner would handle this deal with a sure and accurate touch stopping in four or five hearts. To see the end of this story go to the next page.

Chip Martel and Lew Stansby have been top echelon tournament bridge players for over 30 years but the wheels fell off here. But the slam made!

Brad Moss was on lead against 6♥ and doubled for penalty but when Stansby ran to 6♠ the fact that Moss now passed cast doubt in Fred Gitelman's mind. He decided that his partner had heart values for the double of 6♥. So Gitelman led a heart and that was +980 and 14 IMPs to the Meltzer team who went on to win the event 147-53 IMPs.



NSWBA Library

Best Books in NSWBA Library - Part One by Peter Gill

The NSWBA library has reopened. It costs nothing to borrow books – see a Director or Liz or Carrie in the office. This article gives my opinions on some of the best books in the library.

There are several copies of my favourite bridge book, "Practical Bidding and Practical Play" by Terence Reese. It contains about 70 tough card play hands where you sit beside Reese and follow his thoughts, the very last hand being a classic. The second half is Reese's thoughts on the bidding of lots of hands - most people would regard his bidding ideas as passé but I find it interesting to follow the thought processes of one of the world's greatest ever bridge players. In the last fifteen years I have lent my copy of this book to about ten youngsters who virtually all, having read this book, have gone on to represent Australia. So it's ideal for budding experts.

Peter Jamieson gave me that book for my 21st birthday. My bridge improved a lot when I was 21.

"Play Bridge With Reese" is a similar book. "Master Play" is a Reese classic about expert card play, much loved by theoreticians but not as much by me. Mollo and Gardener's aging "Card Play Technique" is widely regarded as the book to wade through, if you want to elevate your card play to the highest level. Peter Newman regards it as the bible of card play.

Joan Butts (bridge teacher and international rep from Brisbane) wrote in the QBA Bulletin recently that a top American expert playing bridge with her online told her that her declarer play was poor. She disagreed. He told her that she needed to read a basic book on card play. "What, me?" she replied. "But what book do you have in mind", Joan asked anyway. Bill Root's "How To Play A Bridge Hand" was his reply. So she snuck out and read that book. Her card play has improved massively, she told me, and her results confirm this. She now imports lots of copies of this book to sell to banana benders. Is it a coincidence that in the last two years Qld's bridge results have improved - Qld won the 2005 Interstate Women's, were 2nd in the 2005 Butler, and made the 2006 NOT quarter-finals? The NSWBA library has a copy.

The funniest bridge books of all time include Jerry Machlin's "Tournament Bridge - an Uncensored Memoir". Richard Powell's "Tickets To The Devil" is my brother's favourite bridge book, a racy story of the American tournament bridge scene. My brother-in-law likes Chris Ackerley's book "The Bridging of Troy", with great hands but perhaps too many puns for some readers. Victor Mollo's classic series about the Rueful Rabbit: "Bridge In The Menagerie", "Bridge In The Fourth Dimension", "Masters and Monsters" and "You Need Never Lose At Bridge" are Witty and wonderful. When Jason Pitt in about 1989 first came to the NSWBA for a 'Youth Game With Expert Guest Stars', he asked Michael Courtney how he could go from beginner to expert in quick time. Michael told him to read "Bridge In The Menagerie". A week later, Jason borrowed the next in the series, and four weeks later he had read all four books. Shortly afterwards, Jason won the National Open Pairs partnered by Keiran Crowe- Mai. Mollo's books seem to have more than amusement value going for them.

The classic book on defensive signals is Kit Woolsey's "Partnership Defence In Bridge". I think the best, and certainly most readable, book on bridge odds is Kelsey and Glauert's "Bridge Odds for Practical Players". It explains the approach that most top experts take to the maths of the game.

For new players, Paul Marston's "Introduction To Bridge" is in the library, followed by Kantar's "Introduction To Declarer Play" then perhaps Marston's "The Language of Bidding", or his "The Principles of Card Play" or his "All About Notrumps". The reason I like Marston as a writer is because he has a rare gift for putting bridge ideas into easily understood language. (concludes on page 5)

in Australian Bridge Magazine (the library has a virtually complete set of them available) a few years ago, the late Jim Borin in an interview recommended a Mike Lawrence book as the best bridge book of all time. So I read "Play A Swiss Teams Of Four" and "Play Bridge With Mike Lawrence". Both are great but I can't remember which was the one that Jim recommended.

For the experts, Pietro Forquet's "Bridge With The Blue Team" is a must.

A recent addition, donated by Matthew Factor, is the late Alan Truscott's 2005 "The New York Times Bridge Book". This is Truscott's opinionated history of world bridge over the last 80 years, in which Truscott accuses virtually everyone except the Australians of cheating, and explains how they did it. The Austrians, French, whoever, according to Alan they all cheated. Not to everyone's taste but surely the most controversial bridge book of the last few years. The bridge world being whatever it is, this book received very little publicity.

South declared 4H after opening 1NT and received ♦2 lead to ♦A and diamond exit. You strip spades, draw trumps and cash ♦Q proving that West began with six spades to queen, doubleton heart and at least 3 diamonds. You know East began with club length and this is where you could reasonably 'place' the key club card ie ♣10. In my commentary I said that at trick 9 the winning move was to play a club from dummy to the nine. However this fails on ♦2 opening lead if West had been dealt ♠10 x , plus other suit & cards laid out the same. Take a look at this end position with the lead in dummy:

If West is now holding ♠Q108 ♥— ♦— ♣10 x then you must advance ♣Q from dummy and the defence can only score two club winners. (Thanks to Warren Lazer who detected my misanalysis - PBJ)
