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## VALE GAY MARX

Gay Marx, a long time member of Lindfield Bridge Club passed away Saturday 24th July, 2010. She served as a representative for the Federation of Affiliated Bridge Clubs (FABC) for many years and sat on the NSWBA Council in that capacity. She did a lot for affiliated bridge clubs in NSW (especially country clubs) to raise their profile and extend their advantages of being affiliated. She was diligent in safeguarding their interests during her numerous years on the FABC.

She and her family had lived through some hard times after they emigrated to Australia from Germany in 1939 when she was 8 years old at the outbreak of war. Mathematics was one of her strengths and interests influencing her choices of jobs, employment and leisure activities. She was also involved with Probus, volunteer work with several charity organizations - ready with help and advice - and contributed to several charities. She had moved to the Manors of Mosman but later health issues overcame her. There was a memorial service there on Saturday 31st July and some 70 people attended.

This was board 1 from NSW Open Interstate team trials semi-final session 3 (of four). Surprisingly **only two of the sixteen** North-South pairs reached the excellent grand slam in diamonds. Even more surprising was that five of those pairs played this deal in 3NT! One pair reached six clubs and the rest were in six diamonds. NSWBA site has all the names and details! Would you and your favourite partner have reached 7♦? A good board for discussion.....

And now the grand slam bidders:

At table 7 Peter Fordham opened 1♦. East stuck in a skimpy 1♥ overcall. Ed Barnes knew that Fordham could not have a balanced minimum since their system was Acol. Also that 1D guaranteed 4+ diamonds. Barnes launched Roman Keycard Blackwood. Over 4NT Fordham bid 5♠ (two of the five keycards for ♦ plus ♦Q). Barnes now bid 5NT (grand slam try guaranteeing all keycards). Fordham's options were – bid 6♣ to show ♣K if held or if not - sign off in 6♦. A third (rare) option was that Fordham could bid 7♦ with extra unshown goodies such as seven diamonds and say stiff ♥K). In the event he bid 6♣ and Barnes had an easy 7♦ bid.

At table 4 Pauline Gumby opened 1♦ - either any balanced 11-13 hand without a five card major or a natural diamond hand 11+. Warren Lazer bid 2C natural and game forcing. Gumby's 2♦ was an unbalanced minimum, including a 4441 4♦ set diamonds and asks for keycards ( but with the first step showing a minimum hand). Gumby bid 5♦ showing 2 Key Cards plus the ♦Q and a good hand. In the context of the auction. Lazer could have asked about North's clubs but decided to bid 7♦ because he was seeking to pick up IMPs against the other N/S pairs who were 'certain' to be in 6♦.

Here is another excellent grand slam from the NSWBA in April 2010.

- 1♥ was Precision (11-15 HCP, 5+ hearts)
- Hans could not bid 2C as it would be natural and non forcing thus the double is wide ranging

- Zero or 3 keycards for clubs (must be three as would not jump with an aceless hand)

- 2S 5+ C, at least a limit raise

- 5C 2 KC + Q Clubs and a maximum hand in the context of the auction. (4D shows a minimum, and partner can repeat the ask via 4H or retreat to 4NT to play)
- 5H Asking bid in Hearts
- 6D KQ (1<sup>st</sup> step = no A or K, 2<sup>nd</sup> step = K, 3<sup>rd</sup> Step = A, 4<sup>th</sup> step = KQ)

In the Women's Butler only Wendy Ashton and Patsy McCartney of the seven East/West pairs reached the grand:

After Ashton showed six clubs and five hearts, McCartney launched RKCB on hearts, Ashton showed 3 key cards and McCartney could count 13 tricks.

Your editor did some more research and discovered that many of the West players chose to open 1♥ rather than 1♣. The problem with 1♥ here was that many North players came in with 2♥ (Michaels Cue Bid) . After that, none of the East/West pairs were able to locate all the key information to know that seven clubs (or 7NT) was cold. Seven hearts also makes but only if West is declarer.

At my table, the auction took a while to get going and should have reached 7♣ but in the event the bidding fizzled out in a very safe six clubs:

- 1♣ was Acol, denies 12-14 balanced, promised 4+ clubs
- We use 2♦ here as an all purpose game force ( 3clubs here would be a limit raise)
- Natural, 4+ hearts as well and reversing values (15+pts)
- Sets clubs, strong slam hopes, invites control bids etc
- 4NT (RKCB on ♣) is an option here but 4♦ left room for East to show a heart control. However Hutton's 4♠ spiked that plan.
- Your Editor wimped out –should have bid 4NT etc but decided that if West could not take control with 4NT then there could not be 13 tricks.

As you may have guessed, E/W could not reach agreement in the post mortem and had to agree to disagree - - -which happens sometimes in nearly every partnership!

## Four (mini) Book Reviews

### Breaking the Bridge Rules: First Hand

**Author:** Barry Rigal

Rules are made to be broken, and bridge is no exception. The first of a planned four-book series on card play, this book deals with situations where the player who is on lead – defender or declarer, at the start of the deal or in the middle – needs to do something that involves going against the well-tryed adages that every player is taught - An early example features Helgemo underleading an ace at trick1 in a suit contract with devastating effect.

### The Pocket Guide to SAYC

**Authors:** Ned Downey and Ellen Pomer

This book provides a handy pocket summary of the popular Standard American Yellow Card ( SAYC) bidding system. In a concise but readable manner, it goes over the basic ideas of SAYC, which is the most popular natural system for online bridge players around the world. The contents are based on the book *Standard Bidding with SAYC*, by the same authors.

### Deadly Hold-up

**Author:** Jim Priebe

Art Fraser, the bridge-playing detective who made his debut in *Takeout Double*, has left Buffalo and moved his new family to Florida, where he is setting up as a private investigator. However, he's soon called back North to Boston, where a robbery at the ACBL Fall Nationals has left one man dead and a whole lot of money missing. The local homicide cops aren't overjoyed to have Fraser involved, but they're also struggling to understand the ins and outs of the bridge tournament world. The two camps work out an uneasy arrangement as the mystery deepens...

*Jim Priebe (Toronto) is a Canadian international bridge player and the author of two previous Art Fraser books, as well as two technical bridge titles. He is a retired executive, who divides his time between bridge, golf, and grandchildren.*

### Bridge at the Enigma Club

**Author:** Peter Winkler

Robert Tischman is just looking for a game of bridge, but when a mysterious woman persuades him to partner her in a two-session event at the Engima Club, he gets much more than that. This book is a fun read with lots of great bridge deals and a focus on the author's ideas on encrypted bidding and encrypted signals – bids and plays where partners

can exchange information that cannot be deciphered by their opponents. NB these methods, though fascinating and ingenious, are prohibited in many bridge jurisdictions.

*Peter Winkler (Hanover, USA) is a former cryptographer who now teaches mathematics and computer science at Dartmouth College. He originated the idea of encrypted signals some 25 years ago, and has been fighting to legalize them ever since.*

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### SLAM DISASTER AT COFFS HARBOUR

There were 76 teams in the Open Swiss Teams at the recent 2010 Coffs Coast Gold Congress. This board from round 8 caused problems for many pairs. Five pairs reached seven spades doubled, 10 pairs were in six spades and 29 stopped in five spades. In the Restricted Teams (32 teams) two pairs were in 7SX, and five were in 6S. Bridgemates were used, so the results from each table can be viewed on line.

East will open 1S at all tables and West's response will depend on system. If West bids 4D (splinter agreeing spades) it is hard for East to resist bidding 4NT. But since a splinter should be limited to about 10-13 high card points, it pays for East to be cautious and sign off in 4S or else show a heart control by

bidding 4H – expecting West to press on with two aces and a maximum.

Some West's may 'downgrade' their hand ( no control cards) and leap straight to 4S which East should pass ; if playing Bergen raises and West bids 3D ( four spades and 10-11 HCP) then East can bid 4D (control) and will pass West's 4S.

But if West decides to trot out a Jacoby 2NT ( GF raise on spades) then many Easts will punch the 4NT Roman Keycard button. West shows zero or three keycards and this is where wheels may fall off. East can't believe it is zero and surges onwards or makes a next step bid which is misunderstood by West. If E/W are playing ordinary Blackwood then they will stop in 5S – too high (although a few pairs made 11 tricks).

Which leads me to mention an interesting article by George Cuppaidge on pages 6-7 in the July- August 2010 QBA Newsletter. The writer is a well known QLD bridge identity (player, administrator, and writer) who has been on the Australian bridge scene for over 40 years. His 2 page article is simply called **Blackwood** and it is well worth a read. The crux of the article is his modification of KeyCard responses : 5C shows 0 or 4 key cards, 5D shows 1, 5H shows 2 without key queen, 5S = 3 key cards and 5NT is 2 key cards + the key queen.

Is it better than existing versions of Keycard asks? Time will tell. It needs someone to apply the methodology to a large quantity of published slam deals. The inventor of the original method, Eddie Kantar recently published **Roman Keycard Blackwood, 5th ed. The Final Word.**

I plan to go though that book in the coming months to see if Cuppaidge's scheme ( called **Jorj** replies) is an improvement. If playing **Jorj** key card replies on this board, E will know three keycards are missing. **PBJ**
